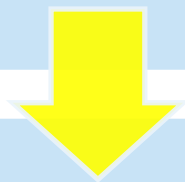


# 1. Introduction

- **The silver medal** at the 2016 Paralympic Games in Rio de Janeiro by the male Spanish wheelchair basketball (WB) team is by far the **best result ever** of this team in official competition in its history.
- Before get into the Paralympic village, that season the pre selection team had **8 main training activities** including preparation **tournaments in Belgium, Poland, USA, Canada, Bilbao and Madrid (Spain), and Brazil** accounting in a total of **49 days of preparation**.
- **Starting in March 2016 with a list of 21** preselected players, **final list of 12 players was provided** by head coach Jose Manuel Artacho at the end of July at the international tournament held in Bilbao.
- **16 years away! from the Games!** After being 4<sup>o</sup> at Atlanta 1996, Spanish male WB team did not attend Paralympic Games again until London 2012

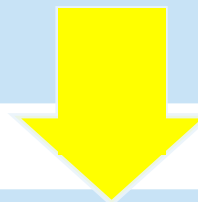

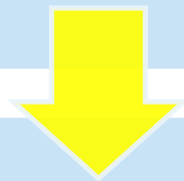

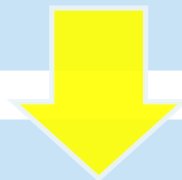

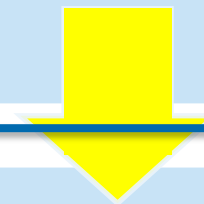

78 games from the World Wheelchair Basketball Championship (2010) and 76 games from the Beijing Paralympics (2008) (men, n = 88 games; women, n = 66 games).

**Men's teams:** Successful 2-point field-goals, free-throws, unsuccessful 3-point field-goals, assists and fouls received were found as discriminant statistics between winning and losing teams in men's balanced games.

**Women's teams:** successful 2-point field-goals.

Linear regression analysis showed that the quality of opposition had great effects in final point differential.

## Wheelchair basketball player performance by game statistics

94 players in 32 games (regular season 12/13) + 10 min: 58 players: Class 1 (n=11), Class 2 (n=12), Class 3 (n=12) y Class 4 (n=23).

# Aim

*To analyse the winning games of the Spanish WB male squad performance at the Rio de Janeiro 2016 Paralympic Games through game related statistics, to assist the decision-making and guidance of athletes preparation and coaches*



## 2. Methods

### Sample and variables

6 games were analysed, participating 7 teams and 84 players. 48 players playing more than 10 min were included in analysis:  
Class 1-1,5 n=11; Class 2-2,5 n=11; Class 3-3,5 n=11; y Class 4-4,5; n=15.

Data were gathered through FIBA Live Statistics Software by experienced officials who followed the IWBF descriptors of each variable and official result book.

- **Team and player game-related statistics:** 2-point shots successful, unsuccessful and percentage; 3-point shots successful, unsuccessful and percentage; free throws successful, unsuccessful and percentage; offensive rebounds, defensive rebounds, assists, fouls, steals, turnovers, blocks and points scored
- **Team variables** were normalized to 100 ball possessions (Oliver, 2004), and **individual variables** from each game were normalized to 40 minutes played

### Statistical analysis

- Descriptive stats was calculated by Spain and opponents
- T-student: To identify differences between Spain and opponents and between classes
- Hedge's ES was used. Significance was set at  $p \leq 0.05$

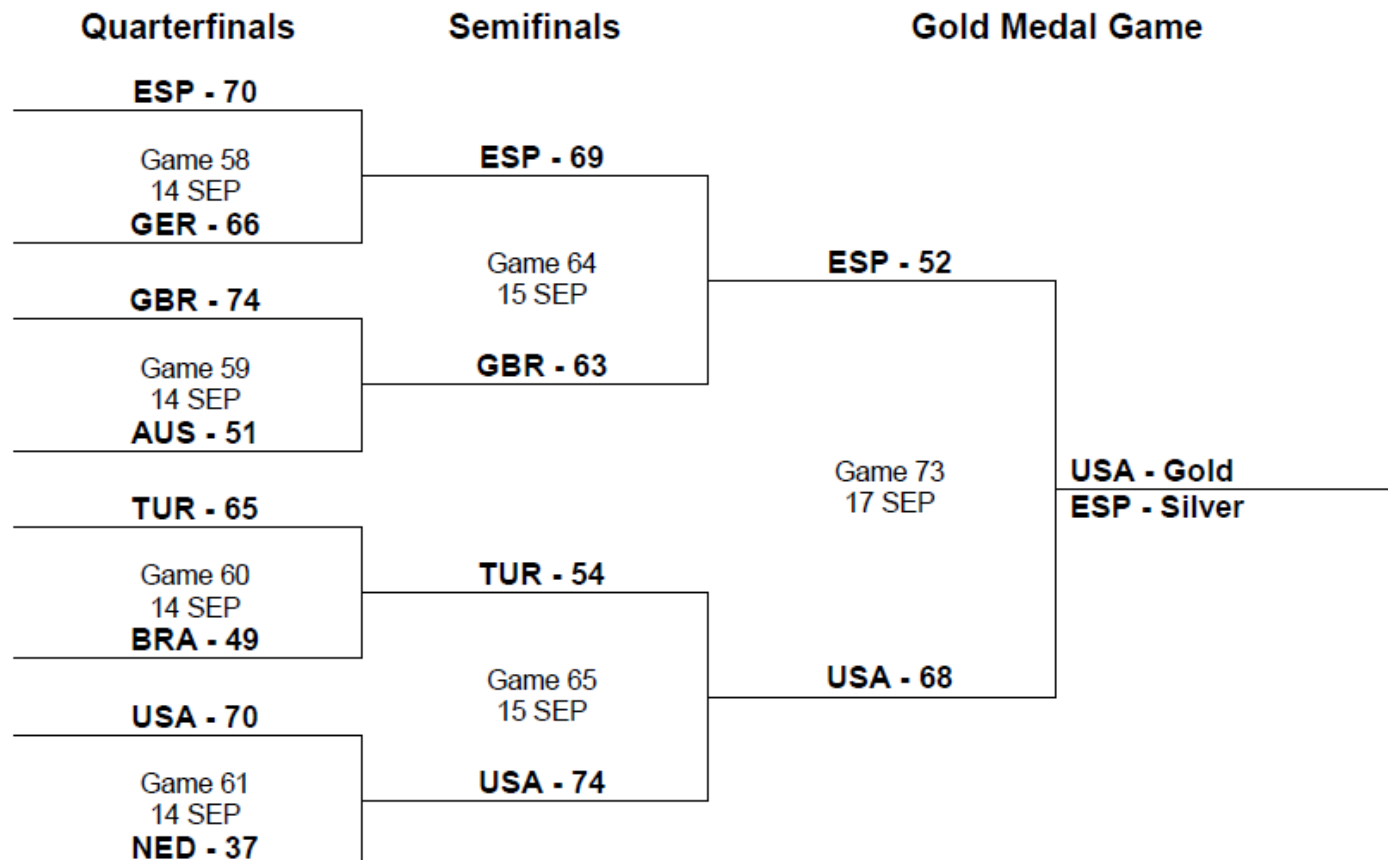

## 4. Discussion

---

- Spanish players were better than opponents for some of the key performance variables in WB along tournament...like 3 point unsuccessful (?).
- As team, Spain was dominant in shooting performance, rebounds and assists...until the final.
- In the final, difficulties to built offense (2x1 on 4 point player playmaker) and adequate shooting position were key in USA winning.
- Change of paradigm in Spanish five on court: it seems that 3 and 4 point players need to be more versatile (ej., 4 point players acting as playmaker, 3 point players as center).
- Relation of functional classification and playing role / specific position on court has changed: the association between the classical assignation of 1-2,5 point players as forwards, 2-3,5 players playmakers and 4 point players centers (Vanlandewijck et al., 2001; Pérez-Tejero, 2011) is difficult to find in last podium teams at international competition.

## 6. Conclusions, limitations and future directions

- Game related statistics are a key tool for performance analysis of WB.
- This piece of research is very valuable by team staff and players in order to maintain playing philosophy and competition preparation.
- Live stats during real competition can be used to enjoy competition (like today!!) but also to help coach and staff to adequately provide live feedback.
- ...hope to see also the Spanish male team qualified for Tokyo, as well as the female team, qualified one month ago for first time ever for a Paralympic Games!
