- Nagano 1998:
  - $\circ~$  I won medals and met my husband.
- Sydney 2000:
  - I worked for Japanese broadcaster NHK and Asahi newspaper and added a Paralympian's perspectives to the stories for a Japanese audience.
- Salt Lake City 2002:
  - I was reunited with Taiki Morii who I first met in 1998. Shortly after the Nagano Games, I was invited to schools to give motivational speeches. Taiki was the first and the only student who asked me "How can I become a Paralympian". Today, he is a six-time Paralympian and multi-medallist in alpine skiing.
- Vancouver 2010:
  - I attend the Games with my entire family and was part of Team Canada.
- Rio 2016:
  - I was an IPC volunteer overseeing activities around Proud Paralympian and IPC Athletes' Council elections
- Tokyo 2020:
  - It was an absolute honour to be a flag bearer at the opening ceremony. My name was the first to be heard in the ceremony.
  - Served as a Deputy Chef de Mission for Japan
- Beijing 2022
  - This was the first Games I attended as an IPC Governing Board member and my first duty was to present a medal to Taiki Morii.
