Re: IPC Shooting Rulebook

Dear IPC Shooting friends,

Following questions received for the updated version of the IPC Shooting rulebook (version March 2010) and as 2010 IPC Shooting World Championships approach IPC Shooting would like to offer clarification on those points for your better understanding. Some of those points occurred due to redrafting of the document and some others need clarification on their interpretation.

For this reason an updated version of the IPC Shooting (March 2010 (v1.1)) is in force.

Please see on the below table clarifications which are also implemented on March 2010 (version 1.1):

<p>2.2.6 At IPC Competitions, and sanctioned competitions all athletes shall have international classification. Athletes with N status require international classification prior to competition start. IPC Shooting determines the allocation of a shooters class and status. Reference to all classification procedures and requirements are contained in the IPC Shooting Classification Manual.</p>	<p>Deleted due to duplication with 2.2.3.</p>
<p>2.4.3.3 Shooting chairs with a height above 45 cm are considered as high shooting chairs. For these chairs a conversion table indicates the maximum height of the chair in relation to the length from the floor to the top of the knee. The conversion table is based on the following calculation:</p> <p>Top of knee x 1,12 = max height of seat</p>	<p>Rule 2.4.3.3 will not be enforced for the 2010 IPC Shooting World Championships and until a new decision is made.</p>
<p>2.4.3.9. There are listed 4 bullet points:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The maximum surface of the seat is 45x45 cm • The sitting angle is unlimited. • The angle of the surface of the seat of the shooting chair is allowed up to 5 degrees from horizontal. • The chair may be upholstered with material compressible up to a maximum of 5 cm. 	<p>The following bullet point is added as this was missed during to the redrafting of the document:</p> <p>“The shooter must be able to remove his/her feet off the floor, without losing balance and without moving the upper body.”</p>

<p>2.5.1.1 Competitors may be allowed to have a target-changer or a loading-assistant if necessary.</p>	<p>The interpretation of the rule is:</p> <p>Target changers may be allowed for all athletes if required depending on the environment of the shooting range (e.g. paper targets) and decision of the Chief Referee, Chief Classifier and Range officer.</p> <p>Loading-assistants are allowed only as described in rule 2.5.1.2 and refers only to SH2 shooters competing in SH2 events.</p>
<p>7.1.3 In competitions up to level 3, two teams per country are allowed in each event.</p>	<p>This should read: In competitions up to level 2, two teams per country are allowed in each event.</p>
<p>7.1. 4 In level 4 competitions, only one team per country is allowed in each event.</p>	<p>This should read: In level 3 competitions, only one team per country is allowed in each event.</p>
<p>7.1.6 Team scores Error! Bookmark not defined. will be shot concurrently with the individual scores, i.e. no separate team matches will be shot.</p>	<p>Deleted: Error! Bookmark not defined.</p>
<p>Included in the IPC Shooting Classification rules and regulations (2005-2008)</p> <p>1.4 Specifications class SH1 and</p> <p>1.5 Specifications class SH2</p>	<p>A note about this part has been added on the Technical rulebook in the end of the equipment section.</p>
