### 3. Event details

#### Description

The 2014 IPC Swimming European Championships will be held over six days from 4-10 August at the Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium.

The competition will consist of a maximum of x medal events, based on final entries and classification.

Morning sessions are scheduled to begin each day at 09.00 hrs and evening sessions at 17.00 hrs.

Qualifying rounds will be conducted for some events. The number of heats or direct finals will depend on the number of athletes entered for each event.

#### **IPC Swimming**

Throughout the world, swimming is one of the most popular sports and the number one individual sport among people with an impairment in the Netherlands. During these Championships athletes from all over Europe will compete for coveted European titles.

Para-swimming is governed by IPC Swimming and coordinated by the IPC Swimming Sport Technical Committee, which incorporates the rules of the International Swimming Federation (FINA). The FINA rules are followed with a few modifications, such as optional platform or in-water starts for some races and the use of signals or 'tappers' for swimmers with visual impairment; however, no prostheses or assistive devices are permitted. The swim distances vary from 50m to 400m in four different swimming styles and 14 different classes. The following events can be distinguished:

#### Competition Description

Most events are conducted as heats for a maximum of eight competitors per class and with the fastest eight swimmers per class competing in the finals. There are various forms for swimmers to start their race; in the water, a dive start sitting on the starting platform or the typical standing start.

During a swimming event, swimmers who are visually impaired are required to have an assistant to help him/her as he/she approaches the swimming pool end wall, either to make a turn or for the finish of the race. This process is called tapping and performed by a "tapper". These swimmers are also required to wear blackened goggles in all their events.



## Classification

To ensure competition is fair and equal, all Paralympic sports have a system in place which ensures that winning is determined by skill, fitness, power, endurance, tactical ability and mental focus, the same factors that account for success in sport for able bodied athletes.

This process is called **classification** and its purpose is to minimise the impact of impairments on the activity (sport discipline). Having the impairment thus is not sufficient. The impact on the sport must be proved, and each in Paralympic sport, the criteria of grouping athletes by the degree of activity limitation resulting from the impairment are named '**Sport Classes**'. Through classification, it is determined which athletes are eligible to compete in a sport and how athletes are grouped together for competition. This, to a certain extent, is similar to grouping athletes by age, gender or weight.

Classification is sport-specific because an impairment affects the ability to perform in different sports to a different extent. As a consequence, an athlete may meet the criteria in one sport, but may not meet the criteria in another sport.

For swimming, the classes that athletes compete in are explained below.

### **Sport Classes**

The sport class names in Swimming consist of a prefix "S," "SM," or "SB" and a number. The prefixes stand for the strokes and the number indicates the sport classes.

The prefixes stand for:

- S: Freestyle, Butterfly and Backstroke events
- SM: Individual Medley
- SB: Breaststroke

### Sport Classes S1 - S10: Physical impairment

There are ten different sport classes for athletes with physical impairment, numbered 1-10. A lower number indicates a more severe activity limitation than a higher number.

You will notice that athletes with different impairments compete against each other. The impact of their impairment on swim performance, however, is similar.

The following gives a few examples for impairments described in each sport class profile:

#### S1 SB1 SM1

Swimmers in this sport class have a significant loss of muscle power or control in legs, arms and hands. Some athletes also have limited trunk control, as it may occur with tetraplegia. These impairments may be caused by spinal-cord injuries or polio. Swimmers in this class usually use a wheelchair in daily life.

#### S2 SB1 SM2

Swimmers in this sport class are able to use their arms with no use of their hands, legs or trunk or have severe coordination problems in four limbs.

As in sport class S1 SB1 SM1, athletes mostly only compete in backstroke events.

### S3 SB2 SM3

This sport class includes athletes with amputations of all four limbs. Swimmers with reasonable arm strokes but no use of their legs or trunk and swimmers with severe coordination problems in all limbs are also included in this sport class.

### S4 SB3 SM4

Swimmers who can use their arms and have minimal weakness in their hands, but cannot use their trunk or legs. Athletes with amputations of three limbs also swim in this sport class.

### S5 SB4 SM5

Swimmers with short stature and an additional impairment, with loss of control over one side of their body (hemiplegia) or with paraplegia compete in this sport class.

### S6 SB5 SM6

This sport class includes swimmers with short stature, amputations of both arms or moderate coordination problems on one side of their body.

### S7 SB6 SM7

This profile is designated for athletes with one leg and one arm amputation on opposite sides, double leg amputations or a paralysis of one arm and one leg on the same side. Moreover, swimmers with full control over arms and trunk and some leg function can compete in this class.

### S8 SB7 SM8

Swimmers who have lost either both hands or one arm are eligible to compete in this sport class. Also, athletes with severe restrictions in the joints of the lower limbs could compete in this sport class.

### S9 SB8 SM9

Athletes in this sport class swim with joint restrictions in one leg, double below-the-knee amputations or an amputation of one leg.

### S10 SB9 SM10

This class describes the minimal impairments of eligible swimmers with physical impairment. Eligible impairments would be the loss of a hand or both feet and a significantly limited function of one hip joint.

### Sport Classes 11-13: Visual Impairment

Swimmers with visual impairment compete in the sport classes 11-13, with 11 meaning a complete or nearly complete loss of sight and 13 describing the minimum eligible visual impairment. Athletes in sport class 11 compete with blackened goggles.

### Sport Classes 14: Intellectual impairment

Swimmers with intellectual impairment who also meet the sport-specific criteria compete in sport class 14.

## About the IPC Swimming European Championships

Two previous editions of the IPC Swimming European Championships were held.

In 2009, the Icelandic capital of Reykjavik hosted the competition whilst in 2011, the Championships were hosted by Berlin, Germany.

The 2014 European Championships follow the hugely successful London 2012 Paralympic Games and come with just two years to go until Rio 2016.

The cycle of regional and World Championships changed before London 2012, meaning that these European Championships are the first since the last Paralympic Games and follow on from the 2013 World Championships in Montreal, Canada.

## 4. Media

### Accreditation

Media can get their accreditation at the Ticket office at the main entrance. The accreditation badge is strictly personal. It may not be transferred to another person. The badge must be worn at all times inside the accredited areas in the swimming stadium.

Accreditation needs to be worn from 3 until the 10<sup>th</sup> of August.

In case you lose your accreditation badge all access in accredited areas are denied. The only accessible part in the stadium will be the Accreditation Centre. There you ask for a new accreditation badge. The fine for this will be 50 euros. Please note that is not guaranteed that you can get your new accreditation badge on the same day.

### Written Press

#### *Positions on the stands*

Press will have a reserved seats on the media stands, on a first come, first serve basis. The stands will be open 30 minutes before the start of the competition and close approximately one hour after the last competition.

### Radio and Television

Radio and television broadcasters will have reserved seats on the media stands. All rights holders and non-rights holders are assigned by IPC Swimming.

### Rights holders

Rights holders requiring access to the field of play will be required to wear X coloured bibs provided to them at all times.

### Non-rights holders (ENRs)

Unless you are an approved rights holder or non-rights holder with approval to film in the mixed zone only, you will not be permitted to film in the venue.

ENRs will also be required to sign an undertaking before receiving their accreditation.

### Accessibility of the stands

The venue is wheelchair accessible via the main entrance. From there you can follow the signs 'Media' to the media stands. Upon arrival you will see that there are two levels. One is wheelchair accessible (level 1). The other seats are situated on level 2.

### Media Information Desk and Media Centre

There will be a Media Centre at the venue, but media can also work in good conditions at the media stands.

The media Information Desk and Media Centre will be open 60 minutes before the start of the competition and close approximately one hour after the last competition.

Paper copies will be available at the media information desk. Other information that is available at the desk includes: medal table, starting lists and press releases.

### Photographers

Photographers will be required to sign an undertaking before receiving their accreditation cards.

#### *Pool deck*

In addition to their accreditation the photographers have to wear a bib in order to be allowed on the pool deck and the photographers working area (PWA).

The PWA is situated close to the pool deck and will be open 30 minutes before the competition start and will close approximately one hour after the last race. At the PWA, high speed internet connections are available free of charge.

#### *Medal ceremony*

Only a few selected photographers – appointed by the photo manager – will be allowed to take pictures in front of the medal stage.

#### *Photographers meeting*

In a special meeting the photo manager will give instructions and lay out the rules and regulations (see also following table). This meeting will take place August 4<sup>th</sup>, time and place to be announced.

## 5. Event details

### Description

Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium



The Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium (national Swimming Centre) opened in March 2007 after an ambitious and comprehensive building and reconstruction activity. The Swimming Centre is unique in both the Netherlands and the rest of Europe and is ideally suited to host international top competitions and events.

The competition pool consists of a ten-lane 50m pool. For official competition eight lanes will be used and the pool will comply to FINA rules and regulations. Behind the large competition pool there is a combined diving and eight-lane 25m pool. The pool with a depth of three meters will be available for training and warming up. Below the stands on the right of stadium you will find a four-lane 50m training pool with 13 cameras which make up the Visual Training System. This system enables swimmers and their coaches to analyse the swimming technique in detail.

All pools can be accessed by stairs on each side. Electronic timing and scoreboards are permanently available. The public and press stand available has 3,000 permanent seats. On the Pool deck special athlete stand facilities will be made available.

### **Pool characteristics (Indoor)**

All pools at the National Swimming Centre Eindhoven are heated to a constant temperature  $26^{\circ}\text{C} \pm 1^{\circ}\text{C}$  according to regulations. The technical installations for heating and environmental control substantiate the Eindhoven slogan 'leading in technology'. Additional measures have been taken, such as the re-usage of conditioned air from the swimming area, the energy efficient circulation pumps and other heat and energy precautions.

The national swimming centre is also the place where swimming as a "sport for every one" is stimulated and is one of Eindhoven's better known tourist and recreational facilities. The recreation area provides the unique combination of a large pool with wave machine, slides, fast flowing rapids, bubble baths, instruction and outdoor pools, diving pools. In short all branches of the swimming sport are available under one roof.

## 6. Organisation

### **International Paralympic Committee**

The International Paralympic Committee (IPC) is the global governing body of the Paralympic Movement. The IPC organises the Summer and Winter Paralympic Games, and serves as the International Federation for nine sports, for which it supervises and co-ordinates the World Championships and other competitions, including swimming.

The IPC is committed to enabling Paralympic athletes to achieve sporting excellence and to developing sport opportunities for all persons with a impairment from the beginner to elite level. In addition, the IPC aims to promote the Paralympic values, which include courage, determination, inspiration and equality. Founded on 22 September 1989, the IPC is an international non-profit organisation formed and run by 176 National Paralympic Committees (NPCs) from five regions and four impairment specific international sports federations (IOSDs). The IPC Headquarters and its management team are located in Bonn, Germany.

Since the first Paralympic Games in Rome in 1960, swimming has been one of the main sports of the Paralympics.

### **Royal Dutch Swimming Federation (KNZB)**

The Royal Dutch Swimming Federation (KNZB) was founded in 1888. It is one of the largest sport associations in the Netherlands with over 150,000 members and 450 clubs. The KNZB has its headquarters in the sport association centre in Nieuwegein since July 2006 and is affiliated to the National sport association NOC\*NSF. All Paralympic and Olympic swimming sports are governed by this body.

### **Local Organising Committee: Foundation International Swimming Events (SIZE)**

A temporary organisation is responsible for the delivery of the 2014 IPC Swimming European Championships, under the direction of event director Paul van Heuvel. The foundation is also made up of project leaders with experience in the organisation of large elite level sporting events. Those responsible for these European Championships are: the Foundation International Swimming Events, the Dutch Swimming Federation (KNZB) and the city of Eindhoven. The office of SIZE is located in the Pieter van den Hoogenband Swimming Stadium.

## 7. Background information

- General information of the Netherlands

The Netherlands is a constitutional monarchy with a parliamentary system, and its government consists of the head of state and ministers. For historical reasons the government and parliament are in The Hague, although Amsterdam is in fact the capital. The Netherlands has a coalition government. King Willem Alexander is the Head of State.

The Netherlands is often called Holland, because of the role the two western provinces North and South Holland played in its history. This region encompasses Amsterdam, Rotterdam, The Hague and other well-known Dutch cities such as Delft, Leiden and Haarlem. However, officially, it is the Kingdom of the Netherlands, consisting of The Netherlands in Western Europe and the Caribbean territories overseas.

### *Surface and population*

Holland is quite small, the surface area is 41,528 square kilometers. The greatest distance from north to south is 300 kilometers, and from west to east 200 kilometers. Holland is one of the most densely populated countries in the world. It has a population of sixteen and a half million and an average of over 400 inhabitants per square kilometer

### *Language*

Dutch is the national language of the Netherlands. Dutch is the mother tongue of well over 21 million Dutch people and Flemish people (Dutch-speaking nationals of Belgium). In the Netherlands Antilles, Aruba and in Surinam (a former Dutch territory), Dutch is used in government institutions and in schools. Because of the historical ties, many lawyers and historians in Indonesia speak Dutch. Dutch was the basis for Afrikaans, the language spoken in South Africa. Dutch has also influenced other languages, as shipping, agriculture and hydraulic engineering terms in various languages testify.

Eindhoven is in fact one of the oldest cities in The Netherlands and has a very interesting history! It received city rights back in 1232. A lively cigar and textile industry developed along the Dommel River. In the Villa park (city centre) you can still see the imposing villas and mansions built by industrialists who settled here.

The creation of the light-bulb in 1891 and the first DAF truck a little later was the beginning of the development and flourishing of the city. Since then Eindhoven has grown to become one of the most prominent cities of Europe in the fields of technology, knowledge and design.

Many top-class international high-tech companies are now located in Eindhoven. The Technical University, Fontys High Schools and the Design Academy continue to attract students from all over the world.

The old city centre was heavily bombarded during the Second World War and was almost completely destroyed. New buildings rose where old once stood. Much of the city's industrial heritage has luckily been preserved; these old buildings now stand in beautiful contrast to the modern architecture appearing in Eindhoven today.

Eindhoven plays a very important role in the world of design. Young designers from home and abroad come here to study at the famous Design Academy. Their final projects can be seen every year in the Graduation Gallery during Dutch Design Week in October, an international event not to be missed.


All extra costs, such as internet, telephone, lunch, dinner and (mini) bar have to be paid upon check out. Reservations will be handled on first come first serve base.

### **Public transport**

Bus lines 17, 407 and 408 from the main NS railway station in Eindhoven take you directly to the central information point for Genneper Parken on the Antoon Coolenlaan. Please note: the departure times at the weekend are different from those during the week.

### **By car**

Genneper Parken is located alongside the A2 (Amsterdam – Utrecht and Maastricht – Aachen), A67 (Venlo – Dusseldorf (GER)), E34 motorway. When travelling by car, leave the Turnhout/Venlo (A67) motorway at exit 33, Waalre/Valkenswaard, and then follow the signs towards 'Genneper Parken'. Follow the road for approximately 500m and turn left at the first set of traffic lights. This road takes you to the spacious car park in the centre of the area.

#### **Routing on A67 from direction Eersel/Antwerpen:**

Before junction "De Hogt" please change to the right carriageway "Randweg Eindhoven (zuid)", and follow the signs exit "afrit 33 Waalre / Genneperparken". At the end of the exit go to the left direction Eindhoven Centrum, Genneperparken. After 500m turn left at the first traffic lights and you will find the large parking area at the left side.

#### **Routing on A2 / A50 from direction 's-Hertogenbosch/Tilburg / Nijmegen:**

Before junction "De Hogt" please change to the right carriageway "Randweg Eindhoven" and choose exit "Afrit 32a + 33 N2", " Randweg Eindhoven". Follow the signs exit "afrit 33 Waalre / Genneperparken". At the end of the exit go to the left "Eindhoven Centrum, Genneperparken". After 500m turn left at the first traffic lights and you will find the large parking area at the left side.

#### **Routing on A67 from direction Venlo:**

Please follow signs Exit "afrit 33 Eindhoven / Waalre / GenneperParken." At the end of the exit go to the right to "Eindhoven Centrum, Genneperparken". After 500m turn left at the first traffic lights and you will find the large parking area at the left side.

#### **Routing on A2 from direction Weert / Maastricht**

Follow the signs " Randweg Eindhoven", Exit "Afrit 33 Eindhoven / Waalre / GenneperParken.

At the end of the exit go to the right to "Eindhoven Centrum, Genneperparken". After 500m turn left, at the first traffic lights and you will find the large parking area at the left side.
