



Anthropological methods

- Ethnography
 - 'Snap-shot' participant observation
 - Fieldwork
 - 1986 to present
- "The purpose of anthropology is to make the world safe for human difference" – Ruth Benedict



Risk of working in areas of social change

- Informed Consent
 - Covert versus overt participant observation
 - Diachronic investigations
- Privacy
 - The public/private debate
 - Problem of distortion of evidence by community members
- Harm (seldom physical damage)
 - Process of doing research
 - Publication of findings
- Exploitation
 - Using research to further a career
 - Issues related to empowerment/disempowerment



Favela of Rio

- A favela Portuguese for slum, is a low-income historically informal urban area in Brazil.
- Access by a chance meeting of the train
- Security precautions
- Standing out like a 'sore thumb'



Sainta Pobreza

- 'There is some much impairment in the region there is no need for the Paralympics to bring it to our attention'
- Poverty means there is a higher degree of impairment
- Embarrassment in government
- Silent 'majority'




Access to support – on the political-economic margin

- The impaired population of Sainta Pobreza had grave difficulty accessing 'the outside' world.
- They expressed the desire to be physically active but opportunities were limited.
- There was no influence of the SDP sector here
 - Yet these people were eager to celebrate the Paralympic movement – many of who were confided within the favela
 - great enthusiasm for life despite the obstacles

Summary

- This pilot study highlights a need for greater research.
- The need to capture the voices of the ever present 'underclass' where impairment is all to often a huge impediment
- In spite of the rhetoric of the IPC and the UN - an inclusive world is still a Utopian dream.
